Mamie died peacefully in the loving care of the staff at Cascade View Nursing Facility. With her strong character and determination she lived to be 100 years old, just 2 months shy of 101. Mamie was born in Prescott, Oregon to John and Melissa Burch. In 1917 the family traveled and moved to Bend. She started school at Kenwood and she graduated in 1932 from the old Bend High School across from the public library. In 1934 she married Oral King, and they remained married for 69 years. They made their home near the present day Bend Senior High School, residing there for over 45 years. Mamie was known as Ma to her family. Her most rewarding job was being a loving mother to her two daughters. Then along came the grandchildren, and she enveloped them with attention and love. She was a very beautiful woman, full of spirit, kindness, and laughter. Her quick wit remained with her during her whole life. Mamie was also experienced in sewing, canning fresh fruit, crocheting, and embroidering. Her devotion to her family did not alter as she cooked all her food on a hot wood stove before she became acquainted with the gas stove top in 1952. She never complained. Mamie had a love for gardening, raising flowers, and birdwatching. Mamie spent her last years at Cascade View Nursing Center. She made many friends there and enjoyed her coffee and cookies. Mamie is survived by her two daughters Patty Wambaugh, Redmond, OR and Mary Ann King, Moro, OR. In addition there are 5 grandchildren, 6 great-grandchildren, and 1 great-great grandson.
